On Thursday 23 November, 4 students doing A-Level Maths (Ryan, Jacob, Sam and Jamie) competed in the FMSP Senior Team Mathematics Challenge. There were 16 teams in total of which 14 were grammar schools and 2 were nongrammar schools. The challenge consisted of 3 different rounds which test all of our mathematic abilities.

In fact the first round we worked as a group of 4 and had 40 minutes to answer 10 questions. In the second round we worked in pairs to complete a maths crossword. One pair would complete the crossword across and the other group would complete the vertical ones. Moreover, the third round was shuttle problems which tested our ability to solve maths problems quickly whilst ensuring we give the correct answer. This is because the answer to one question is needed to complete a different question.

The overall winners of the competition were AGS. However, John Colet won the non-grammar schools competition which resulted in our team getting prizes at the end.

Overall it was a fun, challenging evening which tested all of our mathematic abilities to the limit.

Maths Trip to Warwick University

Students doing A-level maths went on a maths trip to Warwick University on Wednesday 15 November.

The trip mostly took place in the Warwick Arts Centre where we had several speeches explaining how maths is used in the real world. Firstly, we had a speech about whether life is made from maths which was followed by a speech on how antibiotic research and maths link together. This started to make us realise that maths is used in a wide variety of areas and subjects that we didn't think would contain maths.

After this we then had a short speech on revision and A-levels which motivated us to make the best use of our time and gave us tips of how to achieve good grades in the exam. This was followed by a lunch break which gave us the opportunity to explore the university campus and get an idea as to what it is like to come to Warwick University.

After lunch we all came back to the Arts Centre where we listened to speeches on how maths links to politics and sport. What interested us all and what we found extremely interesting was Fermat's Last Theorem and how it took year and years to arrive to a final proof of it. It demonstrated to all of us that maths is all about trying different ways to solve the same problem.

Overall, we all found it an extremely enjoyable and interesting day and were able to take away a lot of things from the very good speeches that were on offer.

On Tuesday 5 December 2017, John Colet School were lucky enough to take part in the 'Sports for Champions' programme. Sports for Champions is an initiative that believes within every child there is a champion waiting to be unleashed and they utilise this through the use of GB elite athletes.

Ezekiel Ewulo (A Great British Olympian) came into school to deliver a training session to year 7 and 8 pupils. Ewulo is a GB long jumper and he took the pupils through one of his typical everyday training sessions.

Pupils had to raise money to take part in the event through sponsorships and out of the total money raised 60% would be kept by the John Colet P.E Department and 40% would go back to Sports for Champions who use the money to help develop the new and upcoming athletes for 2020 Olympic Tokyo.

The day was a great success and the pupils learnt the value and importance of training hard in order to reach your dreams and aspirations.

In total, the school raised a fantastic £1390.00

As a school we get to keep 60% of that which is *£834.00* and 40% of that went to 'Sports for Champions' *(£556.00)* to help the new and upcoming GB athletes.

Safeguarding

As part of our commitment to ensuring students at John Colet are safe and to raise awareness of the dangers associated with anti-social behaviour we will be inviting speakers to highlight the dangers of substance abuse. It is important to safeguard students and provide guidance and support in relation to the use and possession of illegal substances whilst on school site and under the jurisdiction of the school. I am pleased that we have been able to increase the amount of counsellor hours and am encouraged that students are using this service well as well as talking to Matron on a whole range of medical and personal matters. The school counsellor is available for students to access support and advice confidentially and without appointment. In addition to the medical support offered by Matron, we have a School Nurse who is able to support with other issues including questions about substance misuse. We also have good access to support from Young Addaction counsellors should this be necessary. Both the School Nurse and the Young Addaction Counsellor are appropriately vetted and understand the school's Child Protection procedures.

Additionally, in line with most other secondary schools, we will be inviting a team of search dogs into the school on at least an annual basis to educate and alert students about the dangers and the law regarding illegal substances. Students and staff will also be informed that this will be happening regularly although the precise date of the search will not be publicised. Senior school staff will accompany the dogs and their handlers at all times and the day will be fully managed to support students and staff appropriately. Students with a fear of dogs or allergies will not need to go near the dogs and should not be concerned. We have discussed this process with our Police Liaison Officer.
