Recognition Points Mid Year Report.

Recognition points messages are sent to student and parent emails as they are awarded The points add up to an individual and house totals. Students are striving to achieve Bronze, Silver, Gold and the most prestigious Platinum Certificates in recognition of their conduct. These are awarded by Mr Harty each term.

The members of John Colet School Council attended an event at the District Council Offices organised by <u>Youth Voice</u>, an organisation whose main objective is telling influential people, who provide services, about young people's needs and views.

Other Schools in Bucks attended and students were organised into groups, mixing Schools and different age ranges. Each group was tasked with identifying an issue which needed to be addressed and then over the session to come up with realistic solutions or implementation plans to tackle these issues which affected Bucks youth and the broader community. The attendees discussed transport issues, social media in education, youth mental health, school sanctions for behaviour and inter-school competitions.

After lunch the groups delivered a presentation to a panel of experts, including the Mayor, Youth Service Coordinators and members of the Council. The Youth Voice organisers then assured the students that their plans and ideas would be shortlisted and presented again for review and implementation to the relevant sectors and the Schools would be kept involved in this process.

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

Whilst we were in our workshop, the parents were given a presentation by King's College explaining how the university process worked. They spoke about everything from courses and grade requirements to accommodation to the scary idea of student finances. It was really interesting to understand how it all works.

Next, we had a talk from James, a third year medical student, who spoke about life at King's College. He expressed the importance of never giving up on your dream because if you put the work in you can achieve it.

When his speech finished the final graduation ceremony started. Every school was called up one by one and received their certificates. John Colet was finally called up and we received our certificates and posed for photos (which felt awkward!)

After the event we all had our pictures taken again and then were free to explore London!

Year 7 Lepra fundraising

Year 7 are once again working with UK charity Lepra to raise valuable funds for some of the poorest people in the world. Lepra is committed to the eradication of leprosy and to help those whose bodies and lives have already been damaged by it. As an international charity they work directly with communities in Bangladesh, India and Mozambique to find, diagnose and rehabilitate people affected by leprosy. If untreated, leprosy can lead to life-changing disabilities but it is curable and with support sufferers can rebuild their lives.

On Wednesday 6 March Year 7 will have the opportunity to take part in a sponsored workout session to raise funds for Lepra. The students will also be given an insight into what living in areas where leprosy occurs is like and how Lepra helps to support people affected by the disease. A donation of £25 is enough to cure someone with an early diagnosis of leprosy so all donations can help to make a huge difference to people whose lives have been changed by leprosy. 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
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
