Based on the current evidence the teachers will say whether the student is making expected progress for their target. (December progress report will be for core subjects only.)





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Attendance matters

Our average attendance for Year 7 students was 96.2% which is excellent.



Strategies for good school attendance

- Good habits start early in life, so establish good routines, such as reading before bedtime and going to bed on time every night
- Make all appointments for the doctor, dentist, optician etc. after school hours or during the school holidays where possible and take holidays during school holidays
- Take an active interest in your child's school work and offer support with homework
- Make sure your child understands the benefits of regular attendance at school
- Don't let your child stay off school for a minor ailment
- Catch up on work missed through absence



Attendance matters

A few students have an attendance rate of around 90%. To many people this sounds quite good.

- If you have a **90%** attendance record, it means that you are absent from lessons for the equivalent of <u>one half-day every week</u>.
- A 90% attendance rate means that you have missed approximately 100 lessons or 20 days in the school year.
- Over five years this adds up to half a school year.
- Research shows that missing 17 days a year (85 Lessons) will lead to a drop of at least ONE GCSE GRADE.





Key Issues for Year 7

- Homework submission
- > Personal organisation and management of time
 - Behaviour for learning
- Secondary school classrooms are different from primary school classrooms
- Behaviour notices sent home with teacher name on the school day following the incident
 - **Equipment**
- > Ensuring all equipment is bought each day
 - Getting Involved
- Develop character by getting involved in House and extra-curricular events




Homework in Year 7


